PASSi COVID-19 Clinics

As the largest provider of linguistically attuned senior services for Asian and other limited English proficient (LEP) older adults in Southeastern Pennsylvania, Penn Asian Senior Services (PASSi) knows the impact that COVID-19 has had on the lives of seniors. PASSi also knows that the Oak Lane community has been significantly impacted by the pandemic. To help provide seniors and the East Oak Lane community with access to the COVID-19 vaccine, PASSi hosted three vaccine clinics in the month of March. These clinics held in partnership with SunRay Drugs and Centennial Pharmacy have vaccinated nearly 650 individuals. The seniors and community residents receiving the vaccine come from all cultural backgrounds, with PASSi emphasizing the importance of reaching under-

served populations throughout the community. PASSi plans to continue holding COVID-19 vaccine clinics until everyone who is interested in receiving the vaccine is vaccinated.

As part of its second dose vaccine clinics held in mid-April, PASSi also helped community members register to vote. This year's primary and general elections will include several local offices including the District Attorney, Comptroller, and local judges.

Mosquitoes - Don't Let Them Start!

As spring arrives and thoughts turn to enjoying the outdoors, now is the ideal time to prepare your property for mosquito season and help keep them at bay.

They were unbearable last year not only as a quality of life issue, but a health issue as well. Mosquitoes can also carry diseases like West Nile or Zika, and they can fly beyond a typical range of 300 feet to travel 1-3 miles from where they hatch.

Mosquitoes can lay eggs in puddles as small as a leaf or bottle cap. Other trouble spots include standing water in yard debris, gutters, and neglected pools and bird baths. First, rid your property of unwanted standing water without it, they can't breed. Next, treat remaining water (desired or chronic) with a biological mosquito control like Bti. Finally, re-treat your property all season to keep them away.

Bti is a larvicide that interrupts the life cycle of the mosquito, preventing maturation. Summit Responsible Solutions Mosquito Quick Kill, for example, is affordable in bulk at hardware stores or online.

Bti is safe for children, animals, birds, and frogs. It is equally effective on the native species and the prolific, daytime-biting tiger mosquitoes. We all need to



work together - effectiveness requires collective diligence.

In 2015, WHYY featured successful mosquito mitigation efforts in Mt. Airy, highlighting a lesson we can borrow: secured "bait buckets" of treated water to entice egg laying.

With universal use of a Bti product throughout mosquito season, we may be able to enjoy spending time outside again this summer!

Greetings from Housing and Zoning

Zoning Legislation

Please keep your eyes and ears open to virtual City Council meetings. You can listen via WURD radio 900 AM or 96.1 FM, or go to Public Access Channels 40 or 64 according to your cable provider, at 10:00 p.m. or thereabouts, Thursdays to follow the sessions. Public comment is invited regarding introduced bills and resolutions. Several zoning bills are being introduced and passed. Zoning is about land use and, to some extent, population management. Zoning may be designation as Residential (Single, Attached, Detached, Multi-Family) and Commercial. Mixed Use, and Industrial, with specifications and changes to height, depth, front side, and back yard setbacks and square footage requirements. Exemptions, variances, special exceptions, and overlays can carve out or exempt certain plots of land for uses other than provided in the zoning code.

The number of single-family owner-occupied dwellings are becoming reduced as a result of the conversion of single family homes, legally and illegally, into multi-family, group homes, and rooming spaces. Residents of multifamily, apartment, and residential facilities are members of the community and offer their own allegiance and desire to contribute and maintain their residential areas of choice. Zoning does impact the residential patterns,

neighborhood composition, growth development, and environment effects. Particularly in the current climate of homelessness, rising home prices, and a focus on affordability, access, and generational wealth transfers. The zoning code and mapping provides for land use and allocation of geographic space according to the city's vision for growth and development. Those decisions should not be left solely to government employees and private consultants, which is why it is important to keep your eyes on proposed changes and to participate by making your view known to City Council, the City Planning Commission, and to attend RCO meetings in response to proposed zoning changes and requests.

Council President Darrell Clarke presented Resolution #210038, which was passed in City Council and signed by the Mayor to create a Zoning Review Commission. The Commission will review and make recommendations for the zoning process and the granting of zoning variances, impact of zoning on gentrification, affordable housing supply, environmental, and parking considerations, and the RCO process among other areas. No information as to the composition of the Commission, a start date, or duration for the study, or options for citizen input are specified. The most recent

Zoning Review Commission made recommendations, which resulted in changes to the Zoning Code in 2017.

<u>FEMA Spoke to EOL</u> On March 31, Representatives from Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) participated in a virtual information session. Carly Jaiszewski advised that the Center City Convention Center would be shutting down in April and a new FEMA Vaccine Center would be opening on Saturday, April 10.

FEMA is invited, at the State's request, and does not control nor select the vaccines provided. Carly agreed to share concerns about mobile vaccines, in-home administration, and closer vaccine sites. They also shared that CCT service, via Septa, may be utilized for transportation to vaccine appointments.

Esperanza Community Vaccination Center, Philadelphia's second federally supported vaccination clinic, will open to the public in the Hunting Park neighborhood. The entrance to the Esperanza



Community Vaccination Center is located along the south side of West Bristol Street, at 4261 North 5th Street, Philadelphia, PA 19140.

The Esperanza Community Vaccination Center will be open six days a week, eight hours per day, for eight weeks. The hours of operation will be: Monday and Tuesday 7:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m., Wednesday and Thursday 12:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m., Fridays - Closed, Saturday and Sunday 9:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.

The Esperanza Community

Vaccination Center will initially administer the Johnson & Johnson vaccine. The City will prioritize eligible Philadelphia residents who have signed up on the Philadelphia COVID-19 Vaccine Interest Form.

There will also be walk-up appointments at designated times at the Esperanza Community Vaccination Center. To check current vaccine eligibility, please visit the Philadelphia Department of Public Health website. The Health Department telephone is 215-685-5488. This site is accessible by pedestrians, SEPTA public transit and Customized Community Transportation (CCT) services, rideshare, taxi, and personal vehicles. Parking facilities are available and drop-off and pick-up zones have been established. This clinic will provide services for individuals including mobility assistance and language interpretation services in many different languages, including American Sign Language.

Clayton Fitch, Development Manager at PASSi, offered this, "This [past] Thanksgiving, Penn Asian Senior Services helped to donate seven turkeys to our partners at OLCAA. We were grateful to have the opportunity to share the turkeys, which were donated by Senator Sharif Street, with the seniors we serve and our neighbors in the East Oak Lane community.
