Important Information from PECO By Carmen Jimenez

This information is important for all to know and it comes directly from PECO's web site: www.peco.com/know.

On September 10, 2008, PECO filed a plan with the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (PUC) to purchase power competitively, phase-in market-based rates that will take effect in 2011, and implement energy efficiency programs that complement Act 129 and will help minimize price increases and better manage your electric use. Elements of PECO's plan:

For You - the customer:

Market rate phase-in plan: To help ease you into the rising rates that will take effect in 2011, this plan would give you the option to prepare for any increase by paying into a 6 percent interest-bearing savings plan. Your savings plan payments, plus interest, would then be applied to your bills in 2011.

The plan would alternatively allow you to defer a portion of any initial rate increase by spreading out the amount of the first year's increase during the following two or three years, providing additional time to manage new rates

Energy efficiency programs: We will dedicate more than \$50 million to programs and products that can help you manage costs by using energy as efficiently as possible. These would include an enhanced compact-fluorescent light-bulb (CFL) discount program at area retailers, Web-based energy audits, and voluntary programs to control air conditioner energy usage during periods of high demand and high cost. A one to two percent reduction in customer energy con-

sumption would place PECO among the leading utilities in customer energy reduction efforts

Enhanced low-income assistance: A discounted residential rate will be offered to qualifying low-income customers. The discounts vary depending upon your level of income. The discount percentages will be modified to assure the rates are affordable.

Consumer Education: A multi-million dollar consumer education campaign is already underway, and will run through 2012, to raise awareness about energy efficiency and conservation. The campaign will highlight various steps you can take to better manage the transition to market-based electric rates.

Oak Lane Tree Tenders Annual Report 2009

Oak Lane Tree Tenders planted a total of 46 trees in April, May, and November 2009, including 12 trees at Cheltenham Nursing Home, Oak Lane near 5th Street. We cleaned the Broad Street traffic islands. We planted hundreds of bulbs along Oak Lane. We had help from LaSalle students, Saul High School students, Friends of the Oak Lane Library and a staffer from the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society (PHS).

The garden at the Library, planted the year before with Friends of the Oak Lane Library, won second prize in the institutional category in a city wide contest sponsored by PHS

The May 2 Gardens Tour showcased Oak Lane gardens in a fundraiser with a plant sale.

We testified at a City Planning Commission hearing about the Oak Lane Diner which had taken over one of the 3 traffic islands planted under plans developed by Oak Lane Tree Tenders. Our position was that any changes should restore trees and greenery.



Saul High School students mulched trees at Ellwood Elementary School. We contacted the new principal, Ms. Marilyn Quarterman,

who appreciates the trees around the school. We will begin new talks about trees in the school yard.





Zoning News: The Oak Lane Diner By T. Michael Poxon, Esq.

LP Abeer, owner of the Oak Lane Diner, is seeking permission from City Council to continue with construction of a one-story concrete masonry addition, forgiveness of all fines and penalties for not obtaining permits and licenses in advance. Additionally, he wants Old York Road made one way southbound for the single block from 66th Avenue to 65th Avenue, the right to purchase a seven to eleven foot strip of land on Old York Road, thus reducing it to a single lane and part of the street on the north side of the restaurant, where he has already removed trees and other landscaping planted by the Oak Lane Tree Tenders. The three bills, introduced by Councilperson Donna Reed Miller, were before the Streets and Services committee for a hearing in December, 2009 and before the City Planning Commission. The Streets and Services Committee continued the bills to permit members of the Committee to inspect the site. A hearing set for January 28, 2010 was cancelled and the three bills have been tabled pending assurances that Mr. Abeer can comply with all required permits and licenses. The three bills, Numbers 090838, 090839 and 090840 may be viewed at www.Phila.gov website. Go to City Council, Legislation, Search. The Oak Lane Tree Tenders may seek a meeting with Mr. Abeer concerning some \$20,000 in land-scaping that has been damaged by the construction.

The Oak Lane Tree Tenders have not yet taken a position on the bills before City Council, but have argued before the Planning Commission that the Oak Lane Diner, should it acquire land on Old York Road, should make it more green, e.g. by planting

at least six more trees on the east side of Old York Road behind the diner. Those wishing to express their opinion on the construction, the lack of permits and the destruction of the landscaping on the traffic island just north of the Oak Lane Diner, may contact the OLCAA Hotline or Councilperson Donna Reed Miller's office. Her Legislative aide is William Newhewat, who expects that the owner, Mr. Abeer, will probably have to remove the bollards erected in the sidewalk, but that all other construction will probably remain provided the Oak Lane Diner shows compliance with all permits, licenses and inspections.
